RECTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends,

Well, it's started. Early as usual. Christmas tunes, often with words changed to suit the product they are trying to sell, are permeating the airwaves. In the stores, decorations abound as the Christmas music tries to lull you into digging into your wallet to buy something that somebody may not need. Yet it is at the checkout that some stores are very particular in staff instructions. I was in a store the other day and the young man at the checkout wished me "Happy Holidays." I smiled at him and wished him a "Happy Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas." He smiled, apologetically, because it obviously meant something to him. What is so ironic about their term "Happy Holidays" is that the word holiday is made up of 2 words "Holy" and "Day." And that is what Christmas is. A holy day, set apart to commemorate the birth of Jesus - whom we believe to be the Christ, the savior of the world.

The term Merry Christmas says more than just have a good time and enjoy yourself. It is not an exclusive term that is meant to offend anyone. It is a greeting that we wish for all people the peace that Christ can bring if we let him.

Our saying Merry Christmas to someone is our way of offering them a

receive Hanukkah cards from my Jewish friends. It is their way of wishing me the same joy that they feel at Hanukkah.

So even though the people at the stores cannot say it to you because of their employers, wish them and EVERYBODY a Merry Christmas with

the joy that surrounds the festival. It will drive some people crazy, but to most it may be the only greeting they will get that will have a semblance of care and love.

So go ahead. Bring joy to your world, even though it seems the world does not want to allow it. 'Tis the season! I wish all a most peaceful, blessed, and Merry Christmas.
