Dear Friends,

This past Saturday evening I was refereeing a soccer game at Lafayette High school. Kick off was 6p.m. While preparing for the game, and then during the game, we were highly entertained (and a little distracted) by events in the sky. Skydivers with colored smoke coming from their heels. A military helicopter hovered in the distance for a long while until it got its cue and sped very fast over our heads and looked to be going into a dive. It went over us, and towards the location where the skydivers had landed. The helicopter must have only made one appearance as it disappeared from our view and then reappeared as it soared into the sky. The planes circled overhead with their banners trailing advertising all kinds of stuff. We heard the fire works, and one of the girls said to me they must have come on to the field.

It was not our field she was talking about. It was Commonwealth Stadium that was hosting a football game between UK and Louisville. A lot of hype went into that game of a traditional rivalry. Yet the girls at Lafayette high school, with a crowd of less than 50, got to enjoy all the benefits of the pregame air show. In many instances of our lives we all enjoy the benefits of things that others have done.

At St. John's we enjoy a facility that was built long before our time. It was built because people had a vision for the Episcopal Church in Woodford

County. Today we enjoy the benefits of the vision those people had. Over the last 160 years people have continued to make that vision a reality. # The View from the Bench

I have several favorite composers of church music, living and dead, and one of them is Herbert Howells (1892-1983). Howells was born in Gloucestershire, England, and he was first launched into church music as a chorister at the Gloucester cathedral, the Cathedral of the Holy and Indivisible Trinity. I have been a fan of Howells' music from the age of 10, when I first sang his anthem "Like as the hart," which, like all of his music, is highly evocative of mood and space. One could even say time, because Howells borrowed harmonies from Tudor period music while putting on a unique twentieth century twist. Not long ago, I purchased a complete set of Howells' settings of the canticles for Evening Prayer, the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis. One of the interesting aspects of these settings is that they are known by the places they were written for, having been composed for specific choirs. Some of these I have had the opportunity to sing, such as the Gloucester and St. Paul's services, in the places where they were first heard.

It was a very moving experience, and my personal favorite continues to be the Gloucester service, which captures the unique mysticism of that building as one of England's premier landmarks of Gothic architecture in the perpendicular style. The last time I sang that service was in Gloucester in 1999 as a particularly wild summer storm was brewing. As the music reached its climax, the building darkened considerably and thunder echoed through the cathedral. Thrilling stuff--God was surely in that place.

The landmarks of Anglican choir literature, although written mostly for cathedral and collegiate choirs, are not all necessarily out of our reach. There is still an elegance in simplicity which makes some of these works accessible to smaller parishes and their choirs. While much of Howells' choral accompaniments are demanding on the organ, particularly in terms of tonal color, there is still some that we can do. The October Evensong will feature Howells' New

College Service, which was written for the choir of New College, Oxford, in 1953. New College, which was actually founded in 1379 by William of Wykeham Bishop of Winchester, is one of the smaller collegiate choir foundations, and the service he wrote for the New College chapel reflects that. The music still captures power and drama and mystical beauty, but does not require large resources to sing it well. Discovering this gem has been a high point for me this fall. As a congregation, we sing something by Herbert Howells with a degree of regularity. One of the favorite hymns at St. John's is "All my hope on God is founded." It is sung to the tune Michael, which is a memorial composed by Howells for his son who died of meningitis in the 1930's.

Mark your calendars now for Choral Evensong, Sunday October 14, at 5:00 p.m., which will feature the music of Herbert Howells and Harrison Oxley.

# Restoration of Historic Home Benefits St. John's

Or Isham Ready House, or Dr. Twyman House, or any of the many people who have owned 220 North Main.... we could call it the St. John's house now... is the house on the cover this month.

Our parish family is blessed to be very active and growing. Our ministries are expanding every month. Unlike many churches in many downtowns, we are fortunate that those who have gone before us in the stewardship of St. John's have added to the property that belongs to the church. Many churches, when they outgrow their original building, find it necessary to relocate to the suburbs and build much larger buildings—often completely changing the character of their community. We have been provided for in a much better way.

We need more useable space. Several nights a week, all our rooms are full! What a wonderful problem to have with classes and ministries challenging our ability to accommodate them.

The current plan is to restore the Hughes House to a functioning space where we can hold classes, meetings, receptions, and Parish events. An amphitheatre in the back, additional environmentally-friendly parking, and redesigned gardens are all in the concept stage! It can also be available to the community and public as well, thus generating some income. We have applied for historic grant money and have engaged an architectural restoration firm to advise us on the initial structural assessment. We can meet our space needs as a growing parish and be good stewards of the unique architectural heritage of Main Street!

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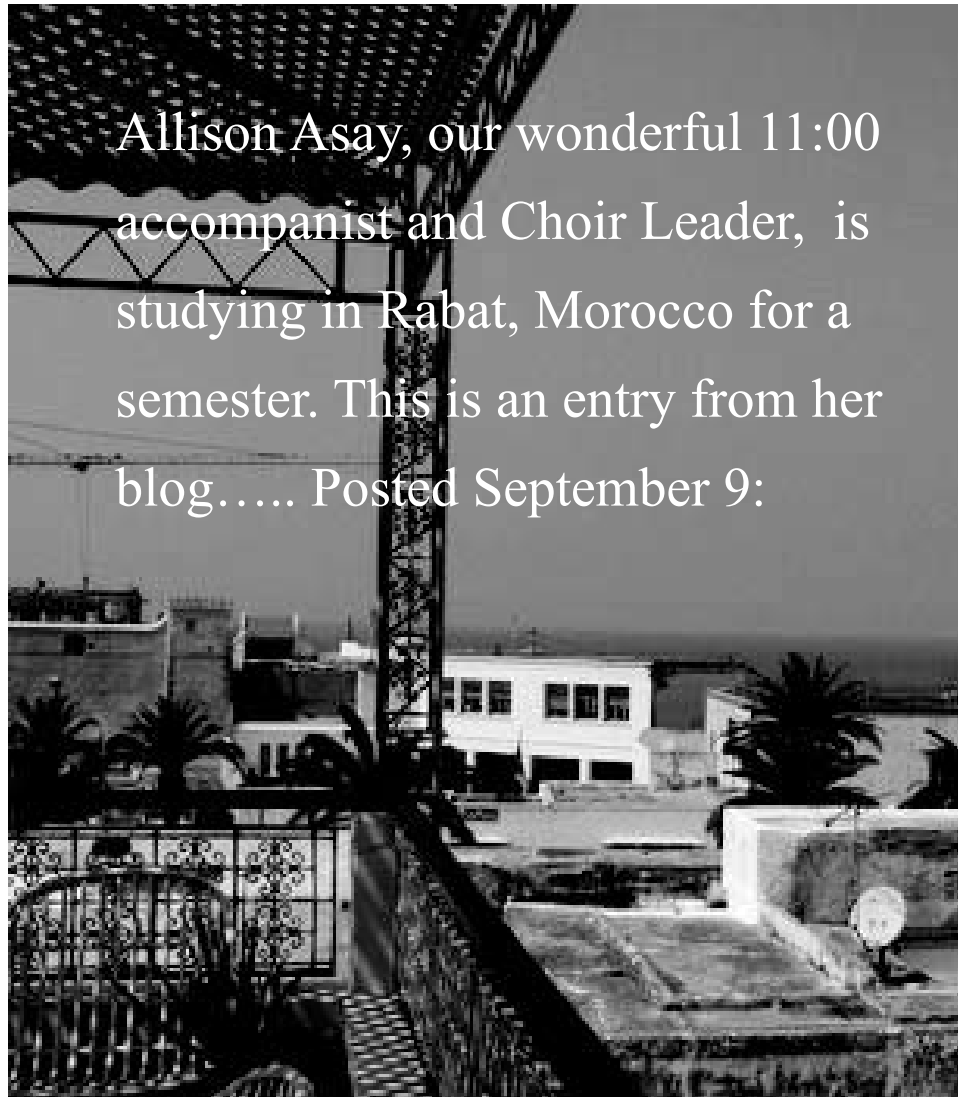

Allison Asay, our wonderful 11:00 accompanist and Choir Leader, is studying in Rabat, Morocco for a semester. This is an entry from her blog..... Posted September 9:

I've been looking for the right moment to write for two days now. Whenever I am in an incredibly extreme mood to type, I am occupied. So now, I will try to wax interesting, perhaps philosophical as well, even though the writing bug has not quite bitten me.

This is my third homestay; the first two were in the states for Junior Miss competitions. I consider myself fairly experienced at the homestay, and as such, take it as a very good sign that (1) I feel comfortable enough and (2) the family is quite pleased that yesterday I helped dry the dishes and today washed and dried my own. I'm acclimating to this life quite easily, keeping my things very organized, neat, and together, and I've already mastered Moroccan table manners. I can eat with only the three fingers of my right hand quite proficiently.

My host family is wonderful. Fatimazahra, my 20 year old sister, speaks nearly fluent English and is a great help when I can't express my meaning to other members of the family. Zeinab is my 13 year old sister, and she and I share a room. My family's home is quite small; the total floor space of the apartment is less than that of my 472 Second Street apartment. Mama Amina and Baba Boubker sleep in one room, which also contains the closets of clothing for the whole family. Fatimazahra has her own room, but her bed is about the size of a large armchair, and her room doubles as the computer room. They have a computer and the internet, which is very very nice. The kitchen is very compact, and all the appliances are at least 75% the size of their American counterparts. Zeinab and I sleep in a



large and long room, the perimeter of which is lined with beautiful navy blue and gold pillows and couches. At least one room in each Moroccan house is decorated in this way, with something of a sectional sofa lining every wall. The room is kept very clean and ready for entertaining. At night Zeinab and I remove some pillows and place sheets and pillows on the couches, and they become our beds. A round table is in the center of the room, and my belongings are hidden underneath, folded into neat piles and divided into zones.

The only other room in the house is something of a family room, again with large long sofas surrounding the perimeter. There is a TV and a DVD player in this room, and the kids are often in here to watch TV, listen to

music and dance. Yassine, my eighteen year old brother, sleeps here at night

I think my family is rather affluent, by Moroccan standards. They have four TV's; one in my parents' room, one with DVD player in the "family" room, one in Fati's room, and a very small one in the kitchen. They have a computer, the internet, and a digital camera, a Western toilet and shower in their bathroom. If not affluent, they are progressive. Fati wears very cute Western clothes, and yesterday I taught her the phrase "dressed to the nines". She looks more Western than I do, in terms of our dress. I want to wear traditional Moroccan clothing, and she wants to look like she's a sorority girl. Very interesting.

I have been amazed at the compactness of things here. The bathroom has half the floor space of my bathroom at 3200 Blenheim Way, or the bathroom at 472 West Second Street. (It's smaller than Rosenthal bathrooms, for Transy kids). The toilet is in the shower itself, so each time someone takes a shower, the toilet paper is placed outside the shower stall so as not to get wet, and the toilet seat is closed. The sink looks to hold at most a pint and a half — definitely not more than a quart — of water, almost the size of an airplane lavatory sink. The shower head is the size of the "sprayer" on American kitchen sinks. The laundry machine, which is in the kitchen, is about the size of my American family's trash compacter. (and the writing had to stop so I could help my family with something).

# ALL SAINTS DAY

## THURSDAY NOVEMBER 1ST

**T**hursday November 1st is the Festival of All Saints. It is one of the great Christian Festivals, the Christian Memorial Day, when we remember not only our particular loved ones who have died but also the countless and nameless millions of Christians who have lived and died in the course of the history of the Church. We will celebrate All Saints at the 5:30 p.m service on Wednesday October 31<sup>st</sup>.

The Church celebrates this festival each year, but it goes largely unnoticed by the secular world. It is the even of this day that is celebrated in our society. The even of All Hallows—Halloween. The word Hallow is an old fashioned one for holy or saint. Ancient people believed that on this night the spirits of the dead returned to the earth and wandered around, returning to their abode of rest at midnight, on the eve of All Saints. So arose the custom of dressing up as goblins and spirits on the day before the holiday.

Historically, All Saints Day developed when the Parthenon, a famous pagan temple in Rome dedicated to All Gods, was dedicated as the Christian Church. It is a round building, and when it became a Christian Church in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, seven altars were around the inside of the building. Under each altar, bones of Christians who had been buried in the catacombs of Rome were placed. Thus the Temple of All Gods became the Church of All Saints. Dedicated on November 1<sup>st</sup>, the Church has kept that date ever since.

At our service on Wednesday, October 31<sup>st</sup>, prayers of thanksgiving and remembrance will be said for our loved ones who have died. If you wish someone to be remembered, please add their names to the list in Hosea Hall.
