The results of our Restore Renew Rejoice campaign are beginning to be seen.

We are seeing scaffolding on the Church as we begin to tuck point the building, and scaffolding at Hughes House as we do the preparatory work to put on the new roof. Over the next few weeks work will begin to remodel the kitchen and sacristy, and repair and replace the floors in the hall, offices, and all of upstairs.

We are under construction. It is the end of the organized fund-raising and the beginning of the work that the funds raised will allow.

It is going to be a little messy at times, and we will have some disruptions to our normal way of life at St. John's (whatever that may be). Yet in the end it will have all been worth it.

Blue Christmas Service at St. John's

Not everyone feels holiday cheer as Christmas approaches. With that in mind, St. John's Pastoral Care Team will be hosting a "blue" candlelight Christmas service on Thursday, December 18th at 7:00 p.m.

This is an opportunity to be in God's presence for those of us who mourn, or who simply feel a need to await the coming of the Christ child in contemplation and solemnity. Many of us experience feelings of sadness, loneliness or fear at this time of year as we face Christmas alone or in despair. We're acknowledging that (holiday) festivities are mingled with sadness for many. We want to offer a holy space and a time when people can come together to give their grief in life up to God.

Psychologist Michael Schwarzchild agrees that the holidays are fraught with many other issues besides grief and despair. Relationships, and financial difficulties and the stress of physical demands of holiday shopping, preparing meals and attending parties. These things leave people feeling blue. He said it is important to "be realistic about your feelings." It's OK to feel sad and stressed. It's OK not to put up a "happy front." Taking time to sit quietly and "feel what you are feeling" is essential, he said, "What is needed at the holidays is God. But people come to God in different ways." This is a different way. A blue Christmas service is a way for people to acknowledge they are disappointed, miss other people, or have high expectations. It is a time for "quiet reflection, remembrance, comfort and hope."

Many churches throughout the country have been so blessed by the Blue Christmas service. I am hopeful that we at St. John's might minister to others in a different way this year. Invite your friend or neighbor to this service. Give a gift of love and care to someone you know. Our hope is in our God of love who comes to us at Christmas. So let us share our place of refuge and help bringing people from throughout the Versailles community.

THE VIEW FROM THE BENCH

For more than a thousand years, churches have been artistic centers for music, visual and dramatic art. It has long been our tradition that a place of worship should be adorned in such a manner as befitting the presence of the deity and creating an atmosphere of reverence and awe. For that reason, our church does not resemble our living room. In a pre-literate age, stories from the Bible were told in stained glass, and even the very architecture of the church could represent various aspects of the story of the Christian faith. Because of the central visible role the Church once played in people's lives, the local church was the meeting place for virtually everything, even as a theatre and on occasion a marketplace. This fall marks the fourth anniversary of my appointment as the organist-choirmaster of St. John's Episcopal Church, and I marvel at how much things have changed and grown in such a short period of time, particularly in the role that this parish plays in the Versailles community. In addition to the various outreach ministries to those in need, we are also becoming a community center, and that includes the arts as we begin a second season offered by the Friends of Music at St. John's.

The Friends of Music at St. John's was begun a year ago with the assistance of Andrew Leonard, who teaches the Childbloom Guitar Program during the week at St. John's. Our aim is to bring regional performing artists to Versailles as part of enriching the musical life of our community. Not just our church, but also our local community. I am pleased to announce that our first program of the 2008-09 season will be **Friday, November 14 at 7:30 p.m.** and will feature the **Godwin-Thompson Guitar Duo** from Nashville, Tennessee. Their performance will feature music from the classical masters to The Beatles, as well as music from Spain and South America. Among other venues, they have been heard at Carnegie Hall in New York and on National Public Radio. Admission will be \$10 for adults and \$5 for students.

The Friends of Music at St. John's is entirely self-supporting and does not receive financial assistance from the church, as this is intended to grow into a community-based program. VESTRY NOMINATIONS

During the coming weeks we will be receiving nominations of St. John's parishioners to run for election to Vestry. The election for Vestry takes place at our annual meeting and those elected will begin January 1, 2009, and serve for three years.

The Vestry meets once per month for approximately one hour. Each Vestry member will serve on a Vestry committee based on their interest, experience or expertise. Father Sutherland makes committee assignments.

Serving St. John's as a Vestry member is a serious responsibility, but an extremely rewarding one.

Please consider being a nominee for Vestry and let your Nominating Committee know of your interest.



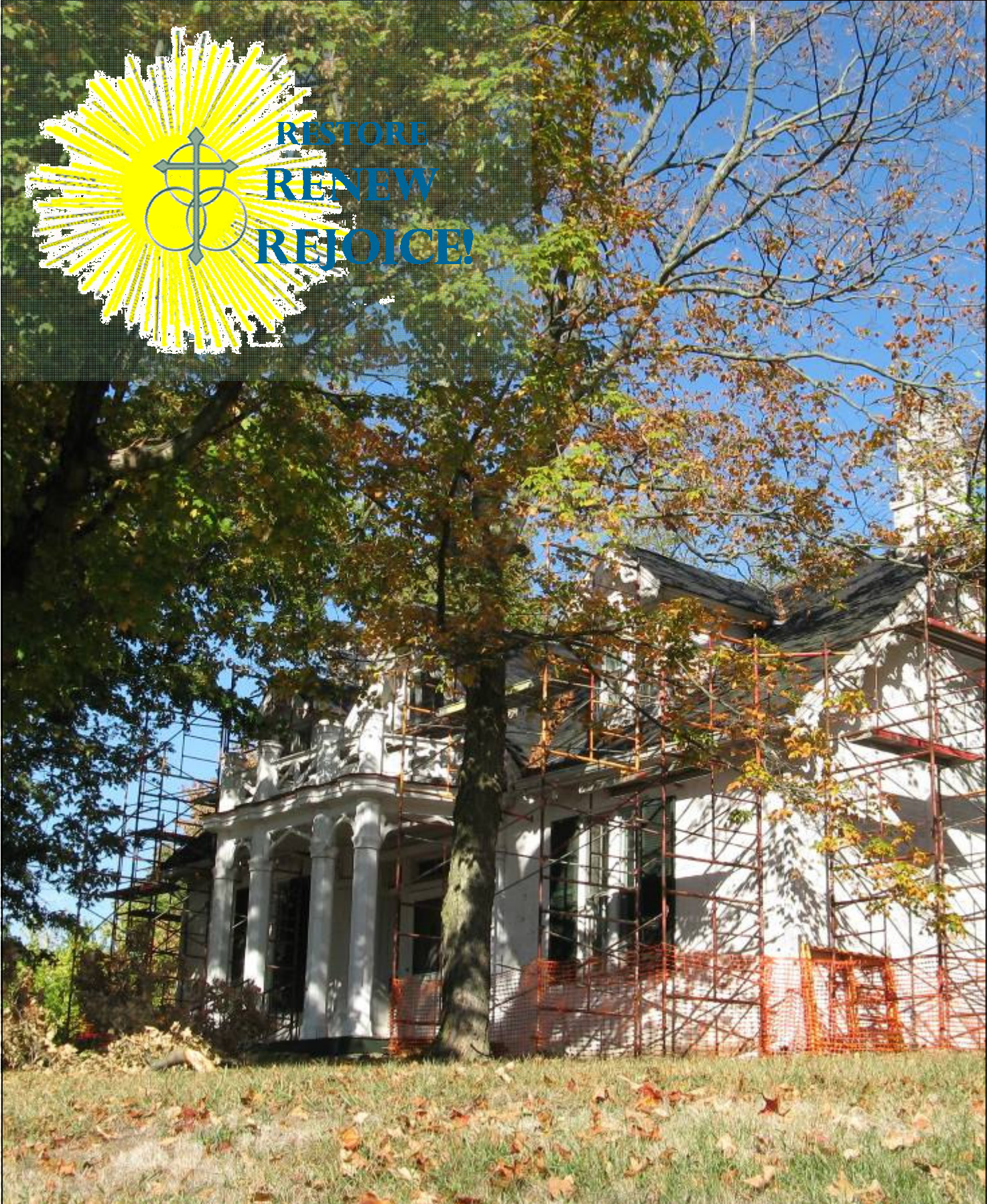

RESTORATION & RENEWAL

Beginning in 2005/2006, the Long Range Planning Committee had been looking at ways to make the most use possible of St. John's properties and buildings. After a parish wide survey, it was decided by the committee and the Vestry to restore the Hughes House to functional condition for our own purposes as well as making it available to the community for hospitality functions. At the same time the committee began working on plans to repair parts of our church building and offices on which needed work had been deferred for many years.

In April this year, we received the Preliminary Concept Plan document prepared for us by Joe Opperman Architects of Winston-Salem, N.C. which mapped out a phased set of recommendations to restore the Hughes House for our uses.

To implement this plan and to do the work needed on our other buildings, we began a capital campaign,--Restore, Renew, Rejoice,-- in June 2008. Running through August 2008, we held 22 neighborhood meetings to one of which every member of the parish was invited. At these meetings, the whole project was laid out in detail. All questions were answered in so much as was possible, and everyone had an opportunity to be heard.

The campaign to date has raised in excess of \$489,000 in pledges over a three year period. The goal was \$1.5 million. We have scaled back what we will be able to accomplish, but we feel sure that the aim of restoring the church and renewing the Hughes House can become a reality.

The order of priorities for the work are the church masonry and inside work first, then at the Hughes House the roof and foundation next. After that would come, as funds were committed, the rest of the work on the Hughes House and grounds. This is the plan which is becoming reality.

The mission work trip to Barnes Mountain this year was a learning experience for all concerned. Our team was small but mighty as they completed many unfamiliar tasks under the supervision of the Ven. Bryant Kibler.

Flooring was installed, tile grouted, drywall cut, installed, and mudded, a shingle roof removed and then replaced complete with new decking, and broken windows in a trailer replaced.

More important even was the opportunity three young people (and four somewhat older people) had to be grateful for the lifestyles we enjoy and to interact with persons who live very differently from us as cherished children of God.

DIOCESAN ECW ANNUAL MEETING

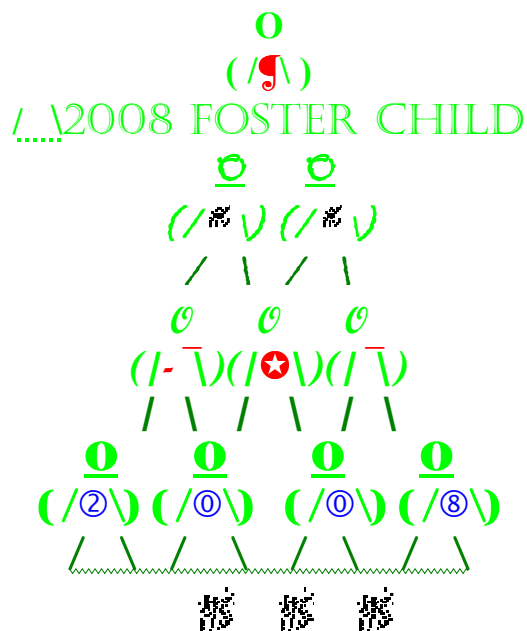
Saturday, November 1 is the Diocesan Episcopal Church Women Annual Meeting at Trinity Church in Covington, Ky. The program begins with Eucharist at 10:30 a.m.. The celebrants will be the Rev. Joe Pennington, Rector at Trinity and the Rev. Anisa Cottrell-Willis. Following the service, a luncheon will be provided by Trinity's ECW, there will be a short business meeting and then a presentation by Anisa on "Women and the Millennium Development Goals." All women are invited and encouraged to attend. It is a wonderful time, a great fellowship opportunity and Trinity is a beautiful example of old-church renovation. If you'd like to car pool up, meet at the church at 8:30 a.m. If you have any questions, you can contact Lisa Hawkins at 338-3012 or Katherine Harper at 285-9336. Babysitting will be provided at Trinity.

Phase 4, the best restoration contractor in the area, was hired to do the masonry work on the church and in the chapel and to do the work necessary on the Hughes House before a new roof can be put on. Also at the Hughes House, they are working with a structural engineer on stabilizing the north wall foundation. The paint is being chemically stripped off the brick in order to assess the masonry condition. The dormers are being reconditioned. The cornices and trim are being stripped so their condition can be assessed and any needed replacement material can be incorporated before the roof decking is replaced. The rear porch, the roof of which is a continuation of the main roof, is being assessed as well so that it can be addressed at the same time as the main roof.

In the parish hall area of the church the hall floor is being replaced with tile, the offices and the library are having the carpeting removed and the hardwood floors refinished. The upstairs is being completely recarpeted and painted. The kitchen is being remodeled with a new tile floor, new counter tops, and new appliances. The sacristy is getting a new tile floor, new counter tops, and reconfigured closets and storage space. (We do have to find something to do with the safe. If anyone has any ideas...?)

Many generous pledges have been made and continue to come in. We will continue to pursue grants and other sources of funding to complete this project. We hope that in the foreseeable future we may be using the Hughes House for much needed parish classroom and meeting space as well as community events and functions.
