RECTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends,

Growing up my family did not attend church. As children we went to Sunday school that was about a mile from our home, and several kids from our street would walk most Sundays. That lasted until I was 11 years old and Confirmation seemed to put a pause in my church affiliation. Until I was 14 Church was not an important part of my life. We went to church when my best friend's dad died, because the vicar told his mom that his dad's name would be read out at church, and it seemed the right thing to do for my friend. But apart from that, church was not very high on the to do list.

Yet at Easter we always got new clothes and shoes. We would be taken clothes shopping a few weeks before Easter. We knew my mom and dad had saved, and looking back they had probably sacrificed. This was a huge deal. We did not go to church, but my sisters and I would be dressed to the hilt for Easter as we gathered with our aunts and uncles, cousins and some we did not know, at our grandparents house for the day. We wore our new clothes with pride, and after Easter we got to wear them. Often.

Each Easter I think about my childhood memories. For me now Easter is really about us being clothed. God through the death and resurrection of Christ has drawn us into a new relationship with God. A new way of living. It is a life knowing that we are forgiven and are asked to forgive. We are clothed with love to become loving people. We are clothed with kindness to show kindness to others. We are clothed with compassion to listen to others. We are clothed with love to be able to love others. And as we move towards Pentecost we are also clothed with the Holy Spirit to have the power to do all these things. Easter is not about getting new clothes just for a day. We are asked to wear them. Not often. But always.

DEACON'S PAGE

What we are learning about Pastoral Care

P Presence: Every human being has a great gift to become present to the other; listening, hearing and receiving. Those who can sit in silence with another not knowing what to say but knowing that they should be there can bring comfort and peace.

A Acceptance: Jesus was unrestricted in his reaching out to needy people. He did not consider background or social status when caring for others. Whoever they were Jesus accepted them. The ministry of pastoral care means to accept others - whoever they are and whatever their background, and state of need.

S Servanthood: Christ said of himself that he had not come to be waited upon but to serve. This concept of servanthood in action is never more clearly seen than in the upper room where he washed his disciples' feet. Jesus proclaimed this act as an example which must be put into practice.

T Transformation: Christian pastoral care not only transforms and supports the receiver but also the giver. Faith can then come alive as questioning and reflecting results in spiritual growth.

O Obedience: Whether clergy or lay, we need to be assured that we are endeavoring to minister in God's place, in his time, and in his way, so that our ministry may be truly a ministry obedient to the divine command. Jesus repeated the question: "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" "Yes Lord," Peter said, "you know I love you." "Then take care of my sheep," Jesus said.

R Relationship: As care givers we enter the world of another person. This is often referred to as a "pastoral relationship". Christians care because of our own relationship with God and are then enabled to care for others. Any pastoral care offered involves entering into a concerned and genuine relationship motivated by the acknowledgement that Christ is the carer.

A Availability: The disciples tried to prevent mothers bringing their children for Jesus to bless. He stopped his teaching, took these children in his arms, and blessed them. The message of Jesus' life and ministry is a call for his disciples of all ages to be ready and available to all people.

L Love: Even God could not communicate his love until he did it in person.....In the same way we cannot communicate the fullness of God's love until we become incarnate.

C Compassion: The word compassion comes from the Latin words *pate* and *cum* which together mean "to suffer with." Compassion asks us to go where it hurts, to enter into pain with another, to share in the brokenness, fear, confusion and anguish. It requires us to mourn with those who are lonely, to weep with those in tears, and to cry out with those in misery. Compassion is being weak and vulnerable and powerless. It brings us face to face with our own humanity and our total dependence on God.

A Action: Pastoral Care requires action in listening, caring, and giving. It is one thing to know and believe in Jesus' ministry, and another thing to live it in our own lives. Without our active part, Jesus' life becomes only another historical and theological lesson.

R Renewal: Jesus spent many hours in prayer with God renewing himself for preaching, teaching and caring for others. Even as he faced Calvary his ministry continued. He forgave his tormentors, as he blessed the dying thief and as he provided for his mother. Only a man being constantly renewed by time spent with God could still be giving under these circumstances. His supreme gift of himself on the cross has renewed the entire world.

E Empathy: The ability to enter and share the feelings of another person put us in touch with our very own fears and doubts, our prejudices and judgments, our own pain and sorrows. What a wonderful gift to share our humanity knowing that God feels deeply the concerns is in our heart.

THE VIEW FROM THE BENCH

As I write this, I am still in the glow of Easter Day. What a magnificent service and a beautiful day! This feeling also serves as a reminder that at this point we are only half way through the Easter season, with Ascension and Pentecost at the end of the month. It is a great time for rejoicing as we see continued celebration and rebirth. Because of the seasonal improvement in the weather, I have been able to get back on my bike again after the winter. One of the great enjoyments of doing that is riding around the bluegrass

region and seeing the change in season. As the green returns, flowers bloom, and the wildlife reappears, I am convinced that we live in one of the most beautiful parts of the country, and if you take the time to look around, Woodford county is really quite stunning. I have also had the added fun of having a riding partner this season and sharing my riding routes as well as the joy of the sport. My riding partner is one of my student workers at Transylvania, and as he nears graduation, he has set for himself the goal of biking across the country in the coming year and writing about his experience. What I am doing is helping him prepare for the longer distances and hilly terrain. This act of sharing also makes me a better rider as well as being able to complete a ride more energized than tired.

The act of sharing also applies to our liturgy and our music. When we partake of the Eucharist, we are united regardless of who or what we are, even with those with whom we are not on a friendly footing. We at least have the Eucharist in common. In last month's column, I spoke of the importance of music and community. The music of the Church belongs to all of us, regardless of ability, and is there for all to share. It pulls us together when things are not so good, and it should do the same when times are good. Sharing makes us stronger as individuals and in our ability to help others. When I left church after service on Easter Sunday, I was indeed tired, as it was the culmination of a series of services each with its own music and required months of practicing, but it was a good tired. I felt ready to do more. It is my intention to finish the Easter season and celebrate the birthday of the Church on Pentecost with the verse anthem "Rejoice in the Lord, alway" by Henry Purcell. It just so happens that 2009 is the 350th anniversary of the birth of one of the greatest of English composers, but his setting of this text, "Rejoice in the Lord, alway, and again I say rejoice," is among his finest work. So, let us all rejoice together!

OPEN CHURCH

At the asking of Fr. Alan, and with the approval of the vestry at its March meeting, we are leaving the red front doors to the Narthex open (24/7) so that the Nave is open and available to anyone seeking solace and sanctuary in these troubled times. The Junior Warden, John Range, has installed a motion-detecting, timed light to illuminate the narthex and a closer to keep the front door from standing ajar.

Please remember to make sure that when the Nave/Chancel areas of the church are not in use, the interior doors of the Nave and Chancel areas are secure; that is, the door to sacristy is deadbolt-locked with the key left in the lockset and the double doors to the chapel hallway are locked with their spring-bolts and the wooden bar is in place.
