## Interim Process from Fr. David

I wanted you to know something about the next steps in the interim process. Some of the first steps already have begun: my getting to know the leadership and church processes; first steps in strengthening staff and congregational leadership and programs; and beginning to understand the church's history.

In June, Dr. Kay Collier-McLaughlin, Deputy for Leadership Development (including the Officer of Transition Ministry), will meet with the vestry and overview the interim period and the search process. This summer we will engage in an exercise designed to enrich the church's understanding of its history with its latest chapter under Fr. Sutherland having been added. Once we've completed that exercise as a congregation, Collier McLaughlin, who is also the Diocesan Consultant guiding congregations through the entire process of the interim and nomination processes, will return in the fall and lead us in the first in a series of four Holy Conversations. ## From the Senior Warden, Ann Richmond

As we enter this new phase of our life together at St. John's with Fr. Perkins as our pastor, we have the rich opportunity to see ourselves through new eyes. It is something we can all do together.

When I was growing up, we raised sheep—as many as 600 one year in the flock—so the biblical allusions to sheep, shepherds, and flocks speak very powerfully to me.

We have a new shepherd. He will do things perhaps a bit differently. And in many ways that's a good thing. We can look at ourselves, our work and situations in a different light with him. We will learn from that. He will look after us as shepherds do. We will question and test his methods and ways, but we can trust that we are all after the same thing: to do the work of the Gospel and show the face of Christ to those with whom we come in contact.

## Outdoor Worship, Holy Eucharist, Rogation Day Celebration and Potluck, Sunday, June 6

We will enjoy our first joint outdoor service of the summer on Sunday, June 6. As part of that day, we will observe Rogation Day. The word "rogation" comes from the Latin "rogare," which means "to beseech." Rogation Day celebrates the fruitfulness of the land and involves a procession around the land with prayers for abundant harvest, good weather, and the preservation of the environment. We also will mark the boundaries of the parish property with the ancient rite of "beating the boundaries."

Normally, Rogation Sunday is observed on the sixth Sunday after Easter, which would have been May 9. The weekday Rogation Days are in the liturgical calendar this year for Monday and Wednesday, May 10 and 12.

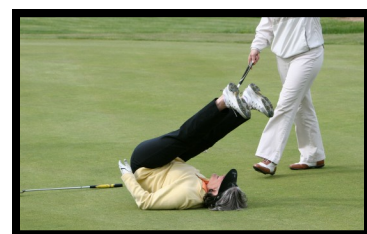
Following the service, we will enjoy an outdoor church potluck with the church providing the fried chicken and drinks.

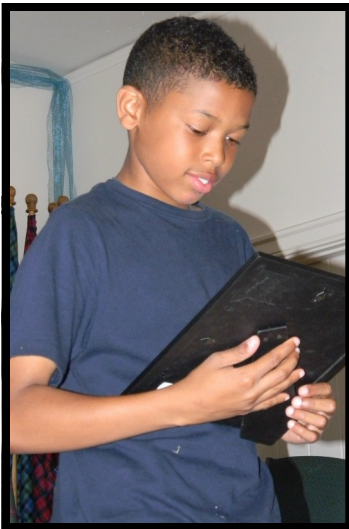

## From Our Interim Rector, David Perkins

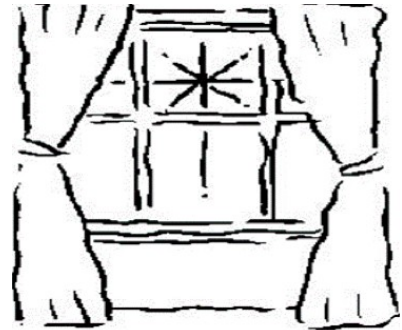
Looking Out My Window, June 2010

On May 23, we celebrated Pentecost Sunday, the beginning of the liturgical season of Pentecost, which stretches from Pentecost Sunday (this year, May 23) until Advent (this year, November 28).

On Pentecost Sunday we celebrate and live into the realities of the birth of the church with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit as related in Acts 2 and John 21. The first half of the church year, with the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter, recalls and re-enacts the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The themes of this season of Pentecost, from now till Advent, have to do with Christian living and the mission of the church in the world.

The traditional terminology for this season (and for the season of Epiphany) is “ordinary time.” But, this season is anything but ordinary in our nonliturgical use of that word. Pentecost symbolizes the days between the birth of the church and Jesus’ return, the in-between time in which we now live.

Our lives get lived out on the stage of time and space, and it is tempting to assume that the world simply continues as always and will continue. But, biblical thought envisions an ending. Whether you take literally the apocalyptic images of angels descending, trumpets, etc., matters not. God intends to bring to an end our corrupting and exploiting of creation and of one another and to usher in a new creation in which the earth is cleansed and renewed and justice flows down like rivers.



Our calling is to live as if this really is an in-between time and to give ourselves to the missions of worship, evangelism, healing, service, and justice. If Christ’s return will bring healing, justice, and transformation, we are called to bring about as fully as possible now the realities he will usher in fully then.

We have no time for date setting or for sitting on rooftops or retreating from the evil world. We have time only for immersion in the world, immersion modeled on Jesus’ way of living and serving.

## St. John's Parishioners Help with Community Clothing Bank

The Hope Ministries Clothing Bank is a free clothing resource for residents of Woodford County. The facility is housed in the small building next to the Woodford County Community Church on Lexington Road just before the Bluegrass Parkway underpass. The Clothing Bank serves approximately 100 families each month.

The Woodford County Community Church donates the facility but we are responsible for paying our portion of the electric bill (heating and air), plumbing, and miscellaneous cleaning products – and the building does occasionally flood. Our electric bill is paid by a grant from the Salvation Army. Donations cover our remaining expenses.

Each Monday morning we accept good used seasonal clothing which is sorted and hung for distribution on Tuesday afternoons. Monday's sorting hours are 8:30 – 11:30. Tuesday distribution hours are 1:00 – 4:00. 13 Woodford County churches are responsible for staffing both days about once every four months. A minimum of four volunteers are needed for both Monday and Tuesday afternoons. However, many hands make light work and we always need volunteers. Volunteers need not always stay the entire three hour shift. We especially need help from 1:00 – 2:30 Tuesday afternoons which is the busiest time.

The Clothing Bank always needs children's clothing especially boys from birth to teen sizes. We always accept donation of good pots, pans, dishes, as well as bedding, towels, miscellaneous household decorations. The Clothing Bank occupies about half of the small building so we have very limited storage. Therefore, any non-seasonal clothing donations are picked up weekly by Goodwill.

The sense of community that we experience with members of our Woodford County community of faith as we work together at the Clothing Bank to serve others is well worth the small amount of time we invest.

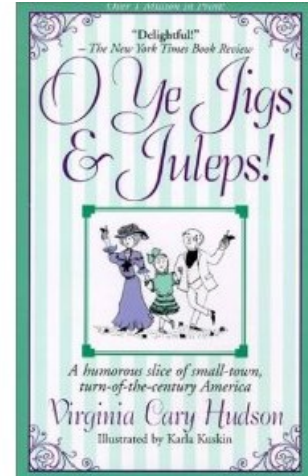
