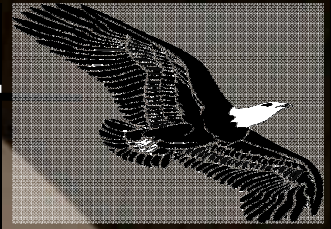
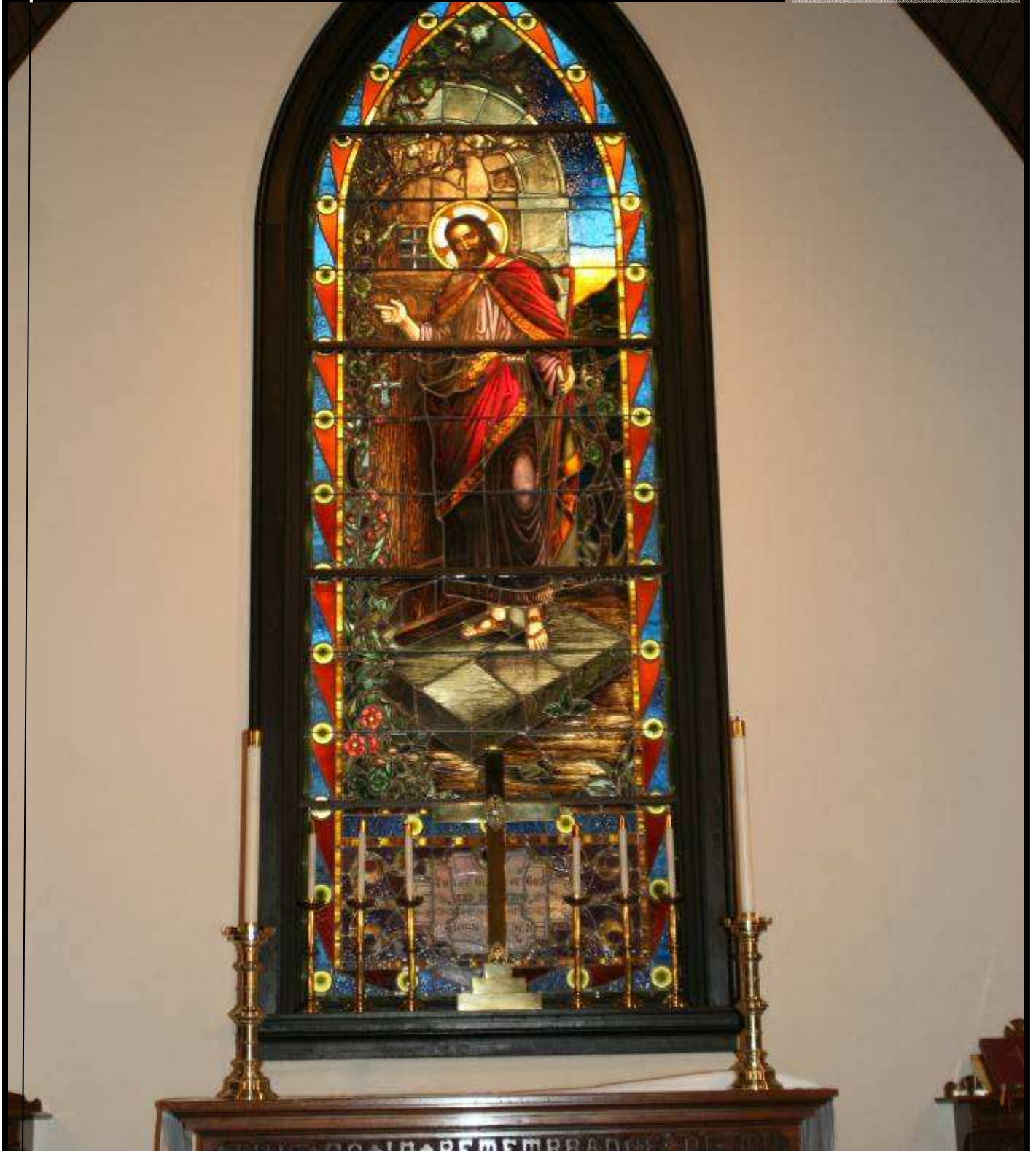

## Greeter Ministry Begins In February

We were aiming to begin the Greeter's Ministry in January, but we were not quite ready. Look for this ministry to begin in February. You will see greeters outside the main entrance and in the courtyard before the 9 and 11:15 AM services. In inclement weather they will be just inside the entrances. They will have a greeter badge on their clothing. They will be seeking to identify people whose faces they don't recognize and make newcomers welcome at St. John's.

You can assist in several ways. First, if you would like to support this ministry, speak to Fr. David or to Jane Gentry Vance, vestry liaison for newcomer ministry.

Second, do not be offended if a greeter says to you, "Hello. Welcome to St. John's. I'm \_\_\_\_\_, and I don't think we've met before." That's their way of responding to a face they don't recognize. We're too large a church, with too many services, for everyone to know everyone. Simply tell them you're a member, and thank them for their concern.

Third, you can avoid distracting the greeter by striking up a conversation. They are making themselves available to welcome newcomers and will not be able to be effective and converse with you at the same time.

By the way, you can introduce yourself to people you don't recognize in the same way. "Hello, my name is \_\_\_\_\_. Welcome to St. John's. I don't think we've met." Better not to ask, "Are you new?" That puts newcomers on the spot, and we're trying to avoid that.

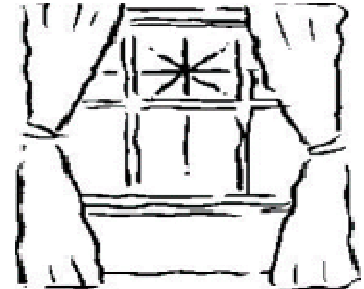


## Looking Out My Window, February 2011

New Testament scholar Leander Keck has said about worship, “When the greatness of God becomes real, the church is renewed, and there is joy in the heart and a song on the lips of the people of God.” (Leander E. Keck, *The Church Confident* (Nashville: Abingdon, 1993), p. 41.) In worship we hope to encounter God’s greatness and experience that renewal.

St. John’s has a unique richness in worship styles. At 8 AM each Sunday, we gather in the chapel for Holy Eucharist without music. Those who prefer silence and a more contemplative experience of worship will find this service especially appealing. The 9 AM Rite 1 choral Eucharist puts the worshipper in the stream of our church’s worship traditions with Elizabethan English and traditional prayers and hymns.

The 11:15 AM blended service still finds its foundation in Holy Eucharist with the four basic movements of a Eucharistic service—gathering, hearing God’s Word, sharing the table in Holy Communion, and dismissal into the world. This service is unique because it combines more traditional music with music employing more modern tune patterns. And, occasionally, as during Epiphany, we use alternative Eucharistic prayers from our church’s resources that employ more inclusive language.



The 11:15 AM service, as I experienced it on arrival, is a blended service, with that combination of traditional and more modern elements in music and language. I find the word “contemporary” an overused and poorly defined term, meaning more or less what the user understands it to mean. Much of the church music labeled contemporary actually is between 20 and 40 years old and displays a wide variety of musical genres and styles.

The 11:15 service, without any intentionality on anyone’s part, has drifted more to the traditional side musically in the past few months. We are in the process of correcting that.

I have experienced rather consistent anxiety among some at St. Johns’ about worship styles; people seem to feel threatened that they will lose the traditional 9 AM service or that the 11:15 service will become a traditional service. I have some understanding of where those anxieties originate. However, please understand that tension over worship styles actually hinders the process of calling a rector.

My hope is that people will relax into the service of their choice; honor the preferred worship style of those who differ, and understand that St. John’s has a unique opportunity to reach a broad spectrum of worshippers with a variety of worship styles in place. I personally am comfortable both in the context of the traditional and the rather modern and blended, as are many other clergy in our tradition.

## The View from the Bench by Stephen Leist

I should begin this with “How I spent my Christmas holiday.” This past December, my wife and I flew to Belize for an 8-day vacation within hours of the late service on Christmas Eve, the mild Caribbean rhythm of our anthem “Jesus Child” by John Rutter still in my head. On this trip, I experienced three different religions. One of the things that I enjoy most about travel is visiting other churches when the schedule allows. I always come away with a good learning experience, and sometimes an idea or two to try out at home. St. John’s Cathedral in Belize City is the seat of the Anglican Diocese of Belize, and it happened to be located around the corner from our hotel. St. John’s Cathedral is the oldest Anglican cathedral in this hemisphere, having been built in 1821 and consecrated in 1826. We worshipped there on Sunday, December 26. Service is early there, before 9 a.m., in order to beat the heat. We were conspicuous visitors, and the congregation of about 130 people was very friendly and hospitable. The service, led by Bishop Philip Wright, was very uplifting. In a rear gallery stood a pipe organ, long silent. The music was supported by an electronic organ, and it was something to hear verses switch between the church organ sound and the string orchestra sound. At the Peace, the organist broke into “Let there be peace on earth,” but just like musical chairs, everyone was back in their seat when the music stopped. Following the service, brunch was served in the yard of the cathedral school next door, consisting of sliced mango and watermelon, slices of ham and turkey, stuffing, cranberry sauce, and the hallmarks of Belizean fare, potato salad and rice with beans. Two women went around serving tea. As we entered the yard, we were greeted by two very smartly dressed little girls. I also had the opportunity to talk briefly with the bishop. We enjoyed it so much, we went back for their Watch service on New Year’s Eve at 11 p.m.

Visiting two Mayan sites in Belize at Altun Ha and Xunantunich was also something of a religious experience. The pyramids are truly majestic and show a great deal of technological expertise. What struck me was the awareness that these places were already ancient, and in some cases had been abandoned for a couple hundred years, before the first construction

of the great Gothic cathedrals of Europe. It was easy to imagine the many religious festivals as well as sporting events that took place in the great plazas. The rain forest canopy spread out below when viewed from the top of a temple pyramid. At Xunantunich, I saw a ball court where a sport not too unlike basketball was once played a thousand years ago. Maybe cheering ancient Cats? More sinister were the temples where blood offerings were made as well as human sacrifices.

The other great religion, if it can be called such, was the bike race held on New Year’s Day. The KREM Radio Cycling Classic is one of Belize’s two national bike races. The race begins 90 miles away up near the border with Mexico and ends on the Central America Avenue in Belize City. In spite of the local Belizeans having been up most of the night celebrating the new year, a large crowd had gathered at the finish line by noon. I am not sure what was more entertaining, the race or the crowd. Such is their passion that when the winning rider in the Elite Men’s competition, a Costa Rican, approached the finish line, there was only silence. The first Belizean rider was about 15 minutes back, and although we did not understand the native Creole, some words of disappointment were pretty obvious.

It is good to be back home again, but at least at the time of this writing, it would be nicer if the outside temperature were about 50 degrees warmer.

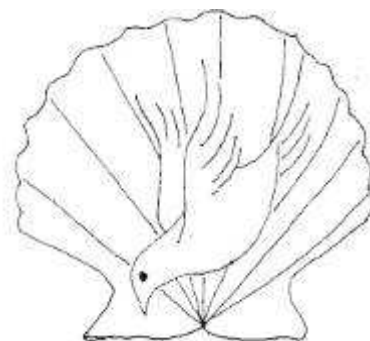
## Diocesan EYC New Beginnings #19, February 11-13, 2011
