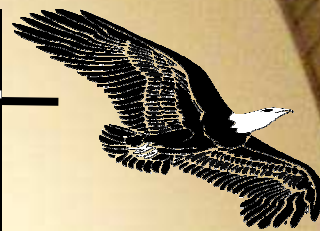

Greeter Ministry Begins This Month

In January you will see greeters outside the main entrance and in the courtyard before the 9 and 11:15 a.m. services. In inclement weather they will be just inside the entrances. They will have a greeter badge on their clothing. They will be seeking to identify people whose faces they don't recognize and make newcomers welcome at St. John's.

You can assist in several ways. First, if you would like to support this ministry, speak to Fr. David or to Jane Gentry Vance, vestry liaison for newcomer ministry.

Second, do not be offended if a greeter says to you, "Hello. Welcome to St. John's. I'm _____, and I don't think we've met before." That's their way of responding to a face they don't recognize. We're too large a church, with too many services, for everyone to know everyone. Simply tell them you're a member, and thank them for their concern.



Interim Process Update from Ned Meekins, Nominating Committee Chair

Following completion of the four Holy Conversations on December 8 your Nominating Committee began the next phase of the search process – that of dissecting and analyzing the large volume of information proffered by the parish membership. This examination of parishioners' wishes, hopes, dreams, and values continued well into the holiday season and should be completed early in the New Year. This information will form the very foundation of our search in that it will define not only the type of candidate we are seeking to attract, but also to an extent the ministries we seek to support and expand. Thus, the Holy Conversations were a vitally important part of the search process.

Third, you can avoid distracting the greeter by striking up a conversation. They are making themselves available to welcome newcomers and will not be able to be effective and converse with you at the same time.

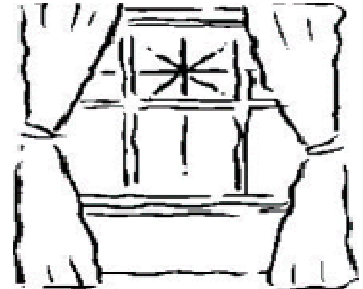
By the way, you can introduce yourself to people you don't recognize in the same way. "Hello, my name is _____. Welcome to St. John's. I don't think we've met." Better not to ask, "Are you new?" That puts newcomers on the spot, and we're trying to avoid that.

Looking Out My Window, January 2010

If you look in *The Book of Common Prayer*, you might find it striking that the first major section addresses the calendar for the church year (pp. 15-33). Why would a book of worship and prayer begin in that way? The Christian year obviously is central to our worship and brings us into a different experience of time, a cyclical ripe experience of time superimposed over the linear time of a calendar year.

The church year begins with Advent and moves to Christmas and Epiphany. We enter Epiphany on Thursday, January 6, a season in which we remember and reenact Jesus' manifestation in his public ministry. The word "epiphany" means a shining forth or upon.

The Gospels tell us that the earliest moments of Jesus' manifestation were to the Magi. Then at age 12, he was manifest to the religious leadership in the Temple (Luke 2). At about age 30, he was manifested to John the Baptist in his baptism.



We pray for Jesus to shine forth in our experience during this season. One of the Collects in *The Book of Common Prayer* is especially important during Epiphany. It is the Collect of the Day for the first Sunday after Christmas and a suggested collect in The Order of Worship for Evening for use in Christmastide, Epiphany, and other Feasts of the Incarnation.

Almighty God, you have poured upon us the new light of your incarnate Word; Grant that this light, enkindled in our hearts, may shine forth in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*
(Book of Common Prayer, page 213)

During this season, which extends until Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent on March 9, join me in making this your prayer. First, that Christ may shine forth in our hearts, that we may see and experience Christ more fully. And, then, we pray that Christ's light may shine through in our words, actions, and personalities to those who pine away in the darkness of a faith-less and grace-starved existence.

Input Sought on Possible Hymnal Revision - Deadline is January 31 (from Episcopal News Service)

By ENS staff, December 15, 2010 [Episcopal News Service] The Episcopal Church Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music is inviting input and comments about a possible revision of The Hymnal 1982.

According to a press release from the church's Office of Public Affairs, an online survey is now available to engage the entire church in a discussion of whether the church's main hymnal needs revision, the Rev. Ruth Meyers, commission chair, said in the release. The survey is available at <http://www.cpg.org/productservices/hymnalstudy2.cfm>.

"We have established this survey as part of the Episcopal Church's ongoing work with liturgical materials and in compliance to Resolution B004 as approved at General Convention 2009," Meyers said. "This is important work in the life of our church and we are grateful for participation as our church embraces this task."

Resolution B004 "authorize(s) Church Publishing Incorporated, working with the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, to conduct a feasibility study on the need for revision of The Hymnal 1982 by speaking to congregations, dioceses and all seminaries of this church, and to report its findings to the 77th General Convention."

Church Publishing, which began as the Church Hymnal Corp., is the authorized publisher of worship materials and resources for the Episcopal Church. Its first title was The Hymnal 1918, which is still in print, according to Church Publishing's website.

The survey, coordinated by the Church Pension Fund's Office of Research, will be available online until January 31.

"The study seeks answers to two basic questions," said Matthew J. Price, Church Pension Group director of analytical research, in the release. "First, do the hymnal and the other authorized resources that the church has for worship music meet the needs of the church? If the answer to the first question is 'no,' then the question should be asked as to whether a new hymnal is the most efficacious means of answering these new needs."

Among the other available Episcopal Church hymnals are "Lift Every Voice and Sing;" "Wonder, Love and Praise;" "Voices Found: Women in the Church's Song" and "El Himnario."

Responses from both the initial phase and the survey responses will be collated and reviewed under the leadership of Jeannine Otis, a musician from the Diocese of New York and commission member.

That review, along with recommendations for next steps, will be presented as part of the SCLM report to the 77th General Convention, which meets July 5-12, 2012, in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The View from the Bench by Stephen Leist

As we start a brand new calendar year, we are still in the middle of Christmas. In addition to being New Year's Day, January 1 is also Holy Name Day, because in the Jewish tradition a child is named several days after being born. It is also only half way through the twelve days of Christmas, which culminates on January 5, otherwise known as Twelfth Night. An old custom was to celebrate Twelfth Night by burning the Christmas greenery in a great bonfire. It is likely that this custom has its origin in pagan ceremonies marking the darkest time of the year by lighting the winter solstice. The first parish my family belonged to when we moved to Greenville SC had a Twelfth Night service, which concluded with a bonfire out in the church parking lot. Everyone who had a live tree brought it to the church, and the firemen from the station down the street would stack the dried-out trees and supervise the burning after the rector started the fire. My memory of this event as a small child was pretty spectacular. It had everything a kid could want: a big fire, several firemen, and a bright red fire truck standing by just in case. And the other kids on our street could never understand why we kept our tree up after Christmas Day.

By the end of the first week of January, we start yet another season of the church year, Epiphany. The Webster's Dictionary defines the word "epiphany"

as a manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something, or an illuminating discovery or realization, in addition to being a church festival. Epiphany begins on January 6, and it is sometimes referred to as the feast of the Magi, or Three Kings. The arrival of the kings bearing their gifts is the first of several signs recognizing Jesus as the Son of God. Each of the Sundays in this season, which this year is 8 weeks long due to the date of Easter, identifies a particular event in the life of Christ or a miracle performed by him in which he was made manifest. The first Sunday of the season celebrates Jesus' baptism, and the final Sunday his Transfiguration. Our music over these weeks will reflect these events, as we share the light of Christ in the world at this darkest time of the year.

Needlepoint Kneelers for Altar Rail Dedicated on December 19

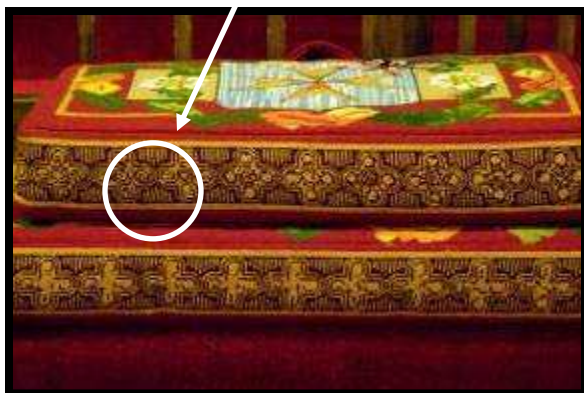
The needlepoint cushions in St. Mary's Chapel are thirty-two years old. After Fr. Alan Sutherland became our rector in 2004, he was approached with the idea of continuing the needlepoint theme for St. John's by making altar rail kneelers for the main church. The question of the theme for the designs was discussed and the Episcopal Church Year was agreed upon. Drawings were made and price estimates obtained, and the plan went forward. The Episcopal Church Women gave \$1,000 toward the project. This was a very generous donation and was much appreciated and it gave us a good start. When the chapel kneelers were stitched, they were offered for dedication at a price of \$50 each. Times have changed and prices increased and the new kneelers were offered for \$500 each.



Due to several happy circumstances, the prices were reduced considerably.
