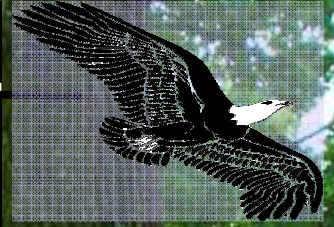

HELP decorate for Reading Club Summer Camp!!

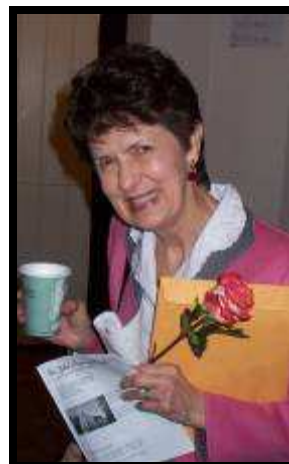
What is your favorite book???

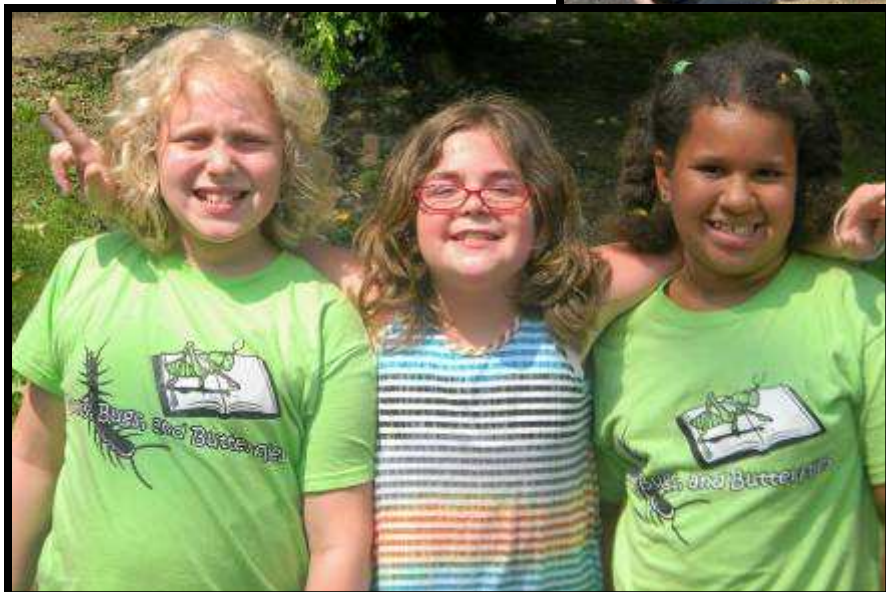
#the Reading Club

Roller Coaster FUN!

Free sodas, free sunscreen and reasonably priced food have made this a family friendly theme park. Sign up forms are available in Hosea Hall to order discount group tickets to Holiday World theme park in Santa Claus IN (about 140 miles from Versailles).

The park will be open from 9: 30 am till 8:30 pm, with the water park closing at 630pm(CDT).

Plan to meet at the church Friday morning at 7:00 am and we will caravan out at 8:00.

If we have 15 or more children and adults planning to go and paid up by Sunday June 5th, we can get the lowest rate of \$29.45 per ticket. Regular admission is \$42.95 for adults & \$32.95 for people shorter than 54 inches.

If we have fewer than 15 attendees, or need additional tickets , I can also get tickets through the Frankfort Regional hospital at \$35.75 and \$30.00.

I already have three people with me in my car but can hold one more.

The ticket forms have spaces to include the height of the people going, as well as if you have a car to drive and have room to squeeze in passengers. If anyone has a 15 passenger van we may want to load it up and keep the group together.

The water park, Splashin' Safari, includes dozens of water tubes, two wave pools, two lazy rivers, a little kids spray area, and a water coaster. Free sunscreen dispensers are placed all around the water park. Lockers are \$10. With \$5 returned with the return of the key, they will hold three or four people's street clothes.

Holiday World's big thrill rides include The Voyage, a coaster with the first three drops measuring 127, 109 and 97 feet, plus two other coasters and a water boat drop with a 162 foot hill. Many of the rides in the original Santa Claus part of the park are only for the shorter kids.

Soda fountains are all over the park where you self-serve your free drinks. Food prices are reasonable; a 1/3 lb burger, fries and a cookie is \$6.99. Bar-b-q ribs are \$8.49 or a pork or chicken sandwich is \$6.19

and is served with potato salad, baked beans and a cookie. Family style dinners include eight pieces chicken, three sides, and rolls for \$32.99

Sign up, invite friends, and we will have fun the first Friday of summer.

The View from the Bench by Stephen Leist

One of the things I am looking forward to this summer is attending the Association of Anglican Musicians annual conference, which will be held in Greenville SC June 20-24. This is the first time I will attend this conference as a member. The AAM conferences are incredible musical and liturgical experiences, as one encounters a variety of services and music that supports them. One of the aims of the AAM is the creative development of the liturgical arts. When I drive to Versailles each Sunday morning between 6:30 and 7 a.m., I frequently listen to Faith Matters on NPR. One installment featured Karen Armstrong, who has written extensively on religious fundamentalism. In this particular program, she spoke of liturgy as a fine art, which requires a great deal of practice to do well. That statement was a great affirmation, because it is so true. What I can look forward to is a great experience with refreshment and new ideas.

I can also look forward to seeing several friends and colleagues and share ideas about our work.

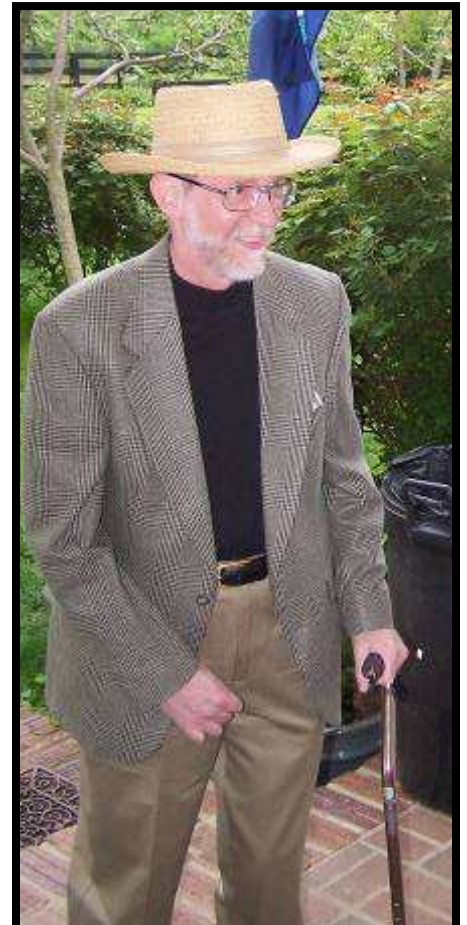
Attending AAM is also a bittersweet memory. The last time I went to AAM was when it was in New York in the summer of 2001. Toward the end of the

week, there was an afternoon concert of the Bach B minor Mass at Trinity Church, Wall Street, followed by a dinner cruise around New York harbor. It was a warm summer night. The conference had been particularly enriching, as one would expect in New York. As we looked at the New York skyline lit up in the night from across the water, it was a stunning sight. It would never have occurred to anyone of us that in 2-1/2 months, that skyline, that city, and our world, would be irrevocably changed by the events of September 11. I was reminded of this on our recent trip to Boston, where we stayed at the Airport Hilton. On the edge of the grounds is Logan Airport's September 11 memorial, because one of the ill-fated flights left from that airport.

As we begin our summer fun, let us remember to embrace life and enjoy every experience and relish the beauty that we have the opportunity to behold.

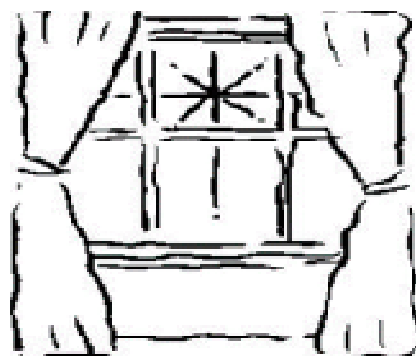






Looking Out My Window, June 2011

On Sunday, June 12, we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, the celebration of the birth of the church with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit as related in Acts 2. The first half of the church year, with the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter, recall and reenact the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The themes of this season of Pentecost, from now till Advent, have to do with Christian living and the mission of the church in the world.



Some of our sister denominations (Roman Catholics, for example) refer to the Sundays after Epiphany Sunday in January and the weeks after Pentecost Sunday as “ordinary time.” That “ordinary time” actually symbolizes the days between the birth of the church and Jesus’ return, the in-between time in which we now live. That explains why the last Sunday of Pentecost, Christ the King Sunday, focuses on Christ’s return at the end of the age—the Pentecost season is bracketed by the descent of the Holy Spirit and the final Advent of Christ.

Our lives get lived out on the stage of time and space, and it is tempting to assume that the world simply continues as always and will continue. But, biblical thought envisions an ending. Whether you take literally the apocalyptic images of angels descending, trumpets, etc., matters not. God intends to bring to an end our corrupting and exploiting of creation and of one another and to usher in a new creation in which the earth is cleansed and renewed and justice flows down like rivers.

Our calling is to live as if this really is an in-between time and to give ourselves to the missions of evangelism, healing, service, and justice. If Christ’s return will bring healing, justice, and transformation, we are called to bring about as fully as possible now the realities he will usher in fully then.

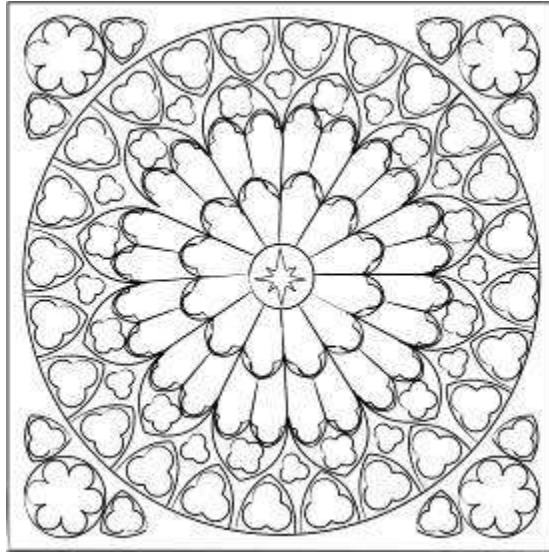
